

Dear God's beloved,

My husband and I recently moved and we are currently living in an apartment in downtown, Lena. These days I hear all the things happening downtown, especially sirens and trains. They are loud. I've already been awakened at 3am when the siren went on twice. I turned the TV up when a train was swinging by during my evening news time. I asked Allie for advice how to survive living so close to trains and sirens. (She suggested having good ear plugs.) I used to live in a decently quiet areas in Lena and am learning to live in a new environment. It's both good and bad. The commute to church is closer, and even I can go back for lunch and come back to work, but at the same time I lost my daily exercise. I am gradually noticing that living downtown is different.

Many of us are learning to live in COVID-19 pandemic time. It's different. It's a new way of living. We are getting familiar with social distancing, wearing masks, washing hands, using sanitizers, and air hugs. Many people utilize phone, texting, snail mails, Facebook, Facetime, Zoom, Google Hangout, and other social media platforms to stay connected to one another. It has been a challenge for many of us yet I think that our love and care for one another has increased because we have to be intentional. Some of us became very creative to survive this uncertain time. We are using God's gift of creativity to love and to protect each other.

I am happy to announce that our council members held a special meeting to decide to resume in-person worship. Please read the letter from council on page 4 in this newsletter. Our council members prayed and took steps to come to this decision. I give thanks to their hard work along with task force members who came up with the recommendation. The service will be different. You may sit in different pews, and worship will be short in order to keep everyone as safe as possible. The liturgy and style of worship may not be the same as we remember, but God's presence and experiencing God's love will remain the same. It is God who serves us in every worship, and God never stops showering us with unconditional love. God is faithful and God's steadfast love endures forever.



Dear Good Shepherd family,

After much discussion and prayer, the church council has decided to resume in-person worship service starting September 6^{th} , 2020. We will meet at 9:30am and worship will not be the same as it was before the pandemic and shutdown in March. The worship service will be short and we ask you to follow guidelines to protect the most vulnerable and each other.

There will be several options. You may worship in the sanctuary or in the Fellowship Hall or you may worship in your car. The service will be transmitted by FM 90.5. We will continue to provide online worship (recorded Sunday worship service) and Sunday reading and prayer through our website and Facebook pages. To those who will worship inside the building these are guidelines we ask you to follow.

- Wear face masks or face coverings while you are inside the building.
- *Keep social distancing (6 feet).*
- Entry will be only at the Washington Street door.
- Before entry temperature will be checked. If you have a fever, we will ask you to go home.
- Please use hand sanitizer which will be located at the stairs and the Fellowship Hall.
- You will be ushered in and out. Ushers will escort persons from the front to the back. Families can sit together.
- No Fellowship Hour at this time. You may converse outside.
- Offering plates will be at the top of the stairs. You also can mail your offering to the church.
- Services will be shown on screen.
- No singing, no walking around to share the peace, no nursery and Children's Message at this time.
- No communion at this time. Home communion will be offered upon request.
- Restrooms will be used one person at a time. They will be disinfected frequently.
- The elevator will be used for one person and his/her caregiver if needed.
- If you become ill during the week after attending worship or find out you have been exposed to COVID-19, please notify the church office immediately.

We are trying our best to protect each other and ask your patience and prayers as we resume in-person worship. If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to contact the council members. We appreciate your understanding.

Quilt Sunday Message for 2020

²³For I (Paul) received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, ²⁴and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body

that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new <u>covenant</u> in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 (NRSV)

In the Words of Institution, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19) Jesus asks his disciples to remember more than just this final meal with him; in my opinion, Jesus is asking them all and all of us to remember his whole life and ministry and all that he has taught us. This is the theme for this year's Quilt Sunday Newsletter Message. "Remember Me" and by doing so, remember the whole ministry of our quilt group-The Piece Corps-and all is represents. Also, remember its members, past and present and all the lives they have touched with all their work. Remember, also, all the many people who have donated time, materials and money to make these 46 years of ministry possible here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Lena, Illinois.

Jesus' words come from the Passover Meal he shared with his disciple family before his death and resurrection. In Luke 22:7-23 we read this story, and verse 19 gives us Jesus' command to his disciples and to us also: ¹⁹ Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

So what does weekly Sunday church communion have to do with Quilt Sunday and our Wednesday weekly quilt gathering meetings, you ask? To me-Plenty! Jesus said, "Remember Me!" To me, that means more than wine, wafers and forgiveness of sins. To me, it means modeling our lives as Jesus lived and showed us what it means to be a Christian and a Child of God. Jesus told us first love God and then to love our neighbors as ourselves. (For reference see: Leviticus 19:18, Matthew 22:36-40, Mark 12:28-34, and Luke 10:25-28—25 Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" 26 He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" 27 He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." 28 And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." Jesus then tells us-The Parable of the Good Samaritan.)

There is no limit set by Jesus on that love. No boundary, no particular place or persons are mentioned—it is universal, unlimited, and can only be constrained by the limit of heart, hands, mind and soul. God says the days are surely coming, He will make an new covenant: Jeremiah 31:33-34 (NRSV) - ³³But this is the <u>covenant</u> that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "K now the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

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I think it is relevant to look at communion, something done each week as part of our service, and look at our Quilt Ministry which is also a weekly event at church. The serving of Communion has changed over time, from kneeling at the altar in small groups, being given an individual glass of wine, to coming forward in two steady lines and receiving a wafer for the intinction of it in a Chalice of wine or grape juice.

The old method was time consuming and usually done on a special occasions and special Sundays. Today, we practice Open Communion-Christ invites us to the table. All baptized Christians are welcome to partake in the body and blood of Jesus Christ.

So too has our quilt making changed over the years from quilts pinned to quilt frames and using wool clothes, to guilts made of cotton and cotton blends to laying and layering them on tables to be tied. We have also been upgraded to a vital church activity and we publicize our mission. What good does it do if no one knows we exist and what we can offer our community in times of need if we don't tell them?!! What has not changed is the very dedicated group of individuals who come to Fellowship Hall each Wednesday morning to do God's Work. As I've also told you in the past, this work goes on throughout the week. In-between each Wednesday we have members of Piece Corps that work all week long, as their schedule allows, to do God's Work. Many cut blocks and sew quilt tops at home. Others come into Fellowship Hall on their day off to work on quilts. Others take material and/or blocks to people's homes and pick up quilt tops. And still others, like to hit the re-sale shops or garage sales, always looking for supplies. You never know who will drop off a bog or box of usable items at church. Here's a familiar phrase, "I saw it on sale, or it was just a quarter, and it was too good to pass up." God is so busy with us—and it's just part of our life and daily routine. We have many volunteers who help in this Mission and we thank all of you for your support, so does God: He remembers all we do for each other. "As you have done if for the least of these, you have done if for me." Matthew 25:40 (NSRV) 40 And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." This is the Holy Spirit praying with us as we march through our day! Our lives are so much richer and infinitely more satisfying when our focus is on others-loving our neighbor and also loving ourselves, as God has commanded us to do.

Thanks be to God and this wonderful ministry-The Piece Corps-that God so richly blesses!

So this is our 2020 quilt summary-a very different year for the Piece Corps Quilt Ministry at Good Shepherd. Could we have a drum roll please!

708 quilts were made this year.

Where do our quilts go? The majority of our quilts are sent to LWR, (Lutheran World Relief) for distribution around the world. Each Fall a semi-trailer is positioned in Monroe, WI., and is loaded with all our area churches' donations. The semi is taken to Baltimore, MD., where the quilts and kits are packed for shipping all over the world. These items specifically requested, so the groups receiving our donations, have been identified and an agency in that country receives the shipment and then distributes it to those groups needing them. The bulletin board in Fellowship Hall has a detailed poster with all this information on it. You can also check out the LWR website.

So in conclusion-here's our 46 year re-cap of our Quilt Ministry at Good Shepherd: Our Quilt Ministry and Piece Corps had another very successful year. <u>708</u> quilts were made this year. Since 1974 (46 years) a total of 17,424 quilts have been made and sent. We do keep score! Thank you to everyone for your help and support. None of this would be possible without the help of many, many hands, lots of donations, and God's Love and Prayers. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

If you would like to help with sending our quilts overseas, you can indicate on your Offering Envelope the amount and write in –"Quilt Shipping Fund." It takes \$2.25 to ship one quilt overseas. For someone who has lost everything in a disaster, like a flood, earthquake, or waryour donation to the shipping fund sends them an uplifting and necessary resource.

Even in the darkest times, Quilts and Care Kits send a message that the world has not forgotten families and children in need. Your gift delivers renewed hope and helps change the lives of many. Thanks to friends like us, Quilts and Care kits have an ever-growing impact in their communities as a source of much-needed supplies.

Martin Luther's Small Catechism

THE CREED

The Second Article: On Redemption

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead [or, "he descended into hell," another translation of this text in widespread use]. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father in eternity, and also a true human being, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord. He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned human being. He has purchased and freed me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death. He has done all this in order that I may belong to him, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in eternal righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules eternally. This is most certainly true.
