What does this mean?


It is true that God's name is holy in itself, but we ask in this prayer that it may also become holy in and among us.

Shepherd's Voice

"A voice cries out: 'In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert, a highway for our God." Isaiah 40:3.

Dear God's beloved,

One day I was taking a walk in a cemetery. As I strolled along the path, I looked up, and saw the horizon. It was bare. It is the time of the year that cornfield were harvested. Wide view was opened up in front of my eyes. I could see barns and farm houses and the horizon miles away. It was stunning view. I paused and gazed at the bare field and beautiful sunset. All of a sudden, the Bible verse came to my mind—"Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert, a highway for our God."

We hear this (or a similar) passage every year in Advent. Preparing God's highway, every hill and mountain being made low. A voice appeared in the wilderness to call our attention to be ready for God's coming. Honestly I never liked this verse. It sounded like God was smoothing out pretty rolling hills and gorgeous mountain views. It sounded like God would drive a bulldozer and flatten any uneven surface. I grew up in the land of mountains and sea. This depiction of God's highway seemed violent. I thought it would take out the charms and beauty of life. But this time the verse spoke to me differently—when we are bare, God's presence comes straight.

This pandemic has been shaking and molding my views, the ways I live, how I read scripture, and even my faith in Christ. The pandemic pushed me out from familiarities and my comfort zone. It was not fun at all but it was necessary. I was worn out and became bare. I am no longer able to cover up or hide my vulnerabilities. Strangely God began speaking to me more straightforwardly than before. Scripture speaks differently than I had never imagined. God has come closer to me.

I think that this pandemic makes us re-imagine our thoughts and beliefs. When God's people were waiting for God to intervene, they were bare. They lost their sovereignty. Their relationships were disrupted. Every family carried pain and wounds. And God broke into their lives. God came down and born as a human child. This year we may feel bare. Our family Christmas tradition may be altered a little bit. And God continue to show up and bring us God's hope. Christ will born for you and me again. Merry Christmas to you and all your loved ones.

Highlights from November Council Meeting

Call to Order: 6:30

Wayne Kurth explained the purpose of the call meeting "Plans for future services" the topic of the evening. All other items were dismissed on the regular agenda.

In short, since Covid-19 started to rise in the area and the schools were in remote learning and the limit of only ten persons in a gathering was mandated, it just seemed that to heat the church, provide someone to be at the door to greet and take temps, have a organist, sound technician, then the number of persons allowed to attend service would be 5. The most feasible decision would be to go remote. Previously Council had decided that if the schools went remote then Good Shepherd would no longer have in-person service until the limit would go back up by the State of Illinois Mitigating Order. It would save the church money not having to have the heat as high and less electricity would be used.

The use of the FM radio for services, the use of streaming through Facebook would be utilized for future services, until the COVID-19 is under control. Council was in agreement on this point of discussion for future services.

The question was then should the use of the phone be another way to get the service out to those who do not have a computer/internet service to watch and listen to the service whether in real time or a few hours later. This was not tabled but that decision would be after a few more test runs.

The phone meeting was concluded by saying the Lord's Prayer over the phone together. 7:00 P.M.

St. Nicholas Day, December 6th

Yes, there really was a Christian Saint Nicholas. He lived in the country of Greece, just a couple hundred years after the birth of Christ. This day is in honor of Saint Nicholas and his life.

Saint Nicholas became a priest, and later, a Bishop of the early Catholic Church. True to the Christian concept of giving up belongings and following Christ, St. Nicholas gave up all of his belongings. He was well known for giving to needy people, especially children. There are many stories and tales of him helping out children in need.

The practice of hanging up stockings originated with Saint Nicholas. As the ancient legend goes, Saint Nicholas was known to throw small bags of gold coins into the open windows of poor homes. After one bag of gold fell into the stocking of a child, news got around. Children soon began hanging their stocking by their chimneys "in hopes that St. Nicholas soon would be there".

It wasn't until the 1800's that the spirit of St. Nicholas' life evolved into the creation of Santa Claus. And, this happened in America. Santa Claus emerged (or evolved) from the stories and legends of St. Nicholas. Santa Claus was kind and generous to children. Unlike "St. Nick", Santa Claus is largely a non-religious character.

Greetings Good Shepherd Lutheran,

Happy Fall! Thought many aspects of life look different these days, the seasons continue to change and Mother Nature is reminding us that pandemic or not, winter is on the way. We got a little taste of winter in Pine Ridge last month with a day of snow on September 8th. At the Reconciliation Center, we are once again planning to provide a matching fund resource for the people living on the Pine Ridge Reservation this winter. We are writing to you in hopes that you will consider supporting the Energy Assistance Matching Fund again this year.

The winter months are beautiful in Pine Ridge, but they are also very cold with temperatures often reaching well below zero and wind chills making it even colder. Families are faced with the financial burden of heating their homes, many of which were not constructed with the intent to withstand South Dakota winters. The Energy Assistance Matching Fund will match families in their contribution up to \$200 to pay their heating bill. We hope to work with families to help ease the burden of high energy costs and keep them warm through the winter.

Because of the generosity of people like you, during the 2019-2020 heating season, 300 households (1,574 people) benefited from the Energy Assistance Matching Program. This year we are anticipating a greater need due to the loss of income from the lack of tourist season and the predictions of a more harsh winter. Would you consider a give of \$240, or a different amount as you are willing and able.





The History of Advent

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word parousia. Most know Advent today as a time of anticipation and expectation of the birth of Christ. However, Advent began as early as the 4th and 5th centuries as a time of fasting and prayer for new Christians. The first mention of Advent occurred in the 300's A.D at a meeting of church leaders called the Council of Sargossa. It gradually developed into a season that stretched across the month of December. Advent lasts for four Sundays leading up to Christmas. The Advent season not only symbolizes the waiting for Christ's birth but also for his final return.



What is the Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. A Lutheran minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays and the four white candles were lit on Sundays.

Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death as the evergreen is continuously green. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible.

Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath. We will go further detail on the purpose and meaning behind each advent candle below. Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red color points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice and death on the cross, shedding his blood for our sins.

Pinecones can symbolize the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection. Families begin lighting a candle on the fourth Sunday before Christmas, and they light another candle each subsequent Sunday.




Here's a great idea for a Christmas gift for Mom, Dad, Grandma or Grandpa. Popsicle stick picture frame.
