They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper. (Psalm 1:3)

I've been learning to knit this winter. Well, I only can do purl stitches, but at least I am trying to learn something which I have never tried

before. Our young adult member is my knitting teacher. She is patient and encouraging. She tells me, "Pastor, it's about muscle memory. Keep doing it, and eventually you will get it."

I wonder if there is muscle memory for our faith, too, I mean something we practice or do on a regular basis, which eventually becomes a part of us. So when a crisis happens, our muscle memory of faith kicks in. Can you think of any examples?

One example for me is prayer. When I was in junior high at my Lutheran school in Japan, I had to memorize the Lord's Prayer (in Japanese, of course!). One teacher who loved to tell us about ghost stories always said to the class that when we were scared at night, recite the Lord's Prayer. Ghosts or evil spirits would go away. I am not sure that the Lord's Prayer in Japanese would work with English speaking ghosts, but I believe that prayer is our muscle memory of faith because whether we are 1 year old or closer to 100 years old or in-between, we can pray anytime and anywhere. No tool is required, just a breath and a talk with God.

And the good thing about prayer is that it can take various styles. The Lord's Prayer is one way to pray (it is a solid basic prayer which Jesus taught us to pray), and another way I like to pray is through singing hymns. Some days I cannot express my grief, worries, or even joys in words, so I sing hymns as my prayer. Hymns are simple but powerful prayers. I witness every month when we lead the Hymn Sing at the nursing home. When the intro of Amazing Grace starts, the residents begin singing from their hearts. Their faith muscle memory kicks in.

Other examples of muscle memory of faith can be tasting God's life through communion, the rhythm of liturgy in worship, daily devotions, reading the Bible (Psalms are good to try), and making a sign of cross while taking a shower to remember our baptisms. If you do not have a regular habit to pause with God in a daily basis, you may try one during this Lenten seasons. Try for 40 days and see how your relationship with God grows.

If you are interested, we have the Lenten devotion book *Wondrous Love_*in the church. Or come to mid-week Lenten luncheon on Wednesdays at 12pm, or show up to mid-week Wednesday Evening Service (supper at 5:30pm, service at 6:30pm) for holy food, God's holy people, and God's holy words. I believe that faith requires discipline. Faith takes time to grow, but eventually we build muscle memory of God's unconditional love. In God's grace, Pr. Miho



Before the 16th-century and the Reformation, the word "vocation" or "calling" was used primarily about people who were dedicated exclusively to serving God and God's people through the work of the church, such as priests, monks or nuns. Reformer Martin Luther expanded the use of this work to include not just religious work, but all of the many kinds of work people do. Luther also expanded the understanding of vocation to include aspects of life other than employment, such as family life, our involvement in our communities and so on. According to Luther, everything we do to respond to the needs of our neighbor in any way is a vocation, a calling from God

In the next four sessions of this Bible study, we will explore vocation in many contexts. As we learn more about how our ancestors in faith heard and responded to God's call, we will reflect on our own lives and callings. How do we help others hear and respond to this call in our own lives.

The criteria for eligibility are as follows:


- 1. Participating member of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

Recipients may not reapply for additional scholarships. Amount of scholarship is not to exceed \$1000, and may be less than this amount as demand requires. Also offered is a \$200 award for adults returning for class work.

Amity Lutheran Church



A Brief History of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church 1857-1970

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church is a merger of two congregations (Amity and Immanuel) who organized on the same date, March 14, 1857, who built and used the same building for eleven years, who went separate paths for ninety-seven years, and who became one again February 27, 1966.

Stephenson County was the last county in Illinois to be settled, waiting until after the close of the Blackhawk War of 1832 for the influx of settlers. The first came largely from New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania, followed closely by the large German immigration. These two groups of people, many Lutherans among them, provided the background for organizing two Lutheran congregations in Lena on the 14th of March, 1857.

The Rev. George Donmeyer, who had been sent from Pennsylvania in 1850 as a missionary to the Lutherans in Stephenson County, served the spiritual needs of those early settlers. Services were held in various homes and in an old stone village school located at the corner of Lena and Franklin Streets.

The Rev. Eli Fair came to Lena in the spring of 1856 in a typical immigrant wagon, settling on a farm one and a half miles northwest of Lena. He began preaching and farming to pay expenses. He was the spiritual father of Amity, organizing it with twenty-seven charter members. Immanuel's congregation was organized the same day by Pastor Donmeyer.

The two congregations, divided because of language and evangelism practices, agreed to build a "house 35 x 50 feet, with a basement story surmounted by a cupola or dome." the two congregations used this building jointly for about eleven years.

During 109 years twenty-two pastors served Amity. One was elected president of Carthage College; another president of Synod. In 1912 during the pastorate of the Rev. Edward Derr, extensive remodeling resulted in the sanctuary we now use.


Thirteen pastors served Immanuel's congregation. Two of these, Pastor Bahr and Piper, served 68 years. Three men have entered the pastoral ministry: Richard Keplinger (Amity): William Heidenreich (Immanuel); and Paul Pieper (Immanuel).

Good Shepherd congregation is marking it's fifth year. It is striving by the grace of God to proclaim Christ in this community and throughout the world. Its worship, study, and fellowship is prayerfully directed toward this God-given goal.




