Shepherd's Voice

"Even if the world was to end tomorrow, I would still plant a tree today."

A quote attributed to Martin Luther.

Dear God's beloved,

The year is ending. For the church calendar the last day of the year is Christ the King Sunday (remember the Sunday we wear HATs to worship?). So according to the church calendar this year ends on November 22nd. What a year we have had! Nobody imagined that we would live through the global pandemic, racial unrest, and severe wildfires and multiple hurricanes and storms. Our routine has been disrupted, plans and schedules were changed, and our patience has run out multiple times. It has been a year of chaos, confusion, frustration, and fear. At the same time this was the year that I witnessed resilience, perseverance, creativity, and caring. In all of these God has been present with us, walking with us, and leading us day after day.

As we approach the end of the church year, the words attributed to Martin Luther came to my mind. "Even if the world was to end tomorrow, I would still plant a tree today." You may have heard different translations of this quote. (When I was looking it up on the internet, there are several versions of this), but the point is clear: trust in God. Even though this quote was probably not said by Martin Luther, it resonates with his theology and life. Martin Luther also lived through several plagues. Luther even wrote about what to do during a pandemic. (If you are interested, you may check out his treaty entitled "Whether One May Flee from a Deadly Plague" published in 1527. You can find it online.) Luther went through colorful life experiences full of trials and tribulations. Yet he trusted God. Luther believed in our gracious God who loved him no matter what he did or did not do. God loves God's children no matter what. Luther probably did not say that he would plant a tree as a daily activity or planting of hope even if the world would end row; nevertheless, this quote inspires me and many Lutherans to live each day to the fullest without being consumed by fear of uncertainty. Live each day and trust God who created the heaven and earth, who breathed life to us and all God's creatures, and whose love is unconditional and never ending. There were days I felt stressed out and with no energy to go on with so many changes happening constantly. But you know, we live day by day. God gives us life each day. Do the task for the day, that will be enough. God is good my friends! And Happy New Year!


We each have the potential to improve each others lives through understanding and kindness. Whether it's a friend, family member, coworker or stranger, our ability to show our humanity should have no limit.

History of God's Eye



A God's eye (in <u>Spanish</u>, *Ojo de Dios*) is a spiritual and votive object made by weaving a design out of yarn upon a wooden cross. Often several colors are used. They are commonly found in <u>Mexican</u> and <u>Mexican American</u> communities, among both Indigenous and Catholic peoples.

Ojos de Dios are common in the <u>Pueblos</u> of <u>New Mexico</u>. Often they reflect a confidence in all-seeing Providence. The spiritual eye of the *Ojos de Dios* is thought by some believers to have the power to see and understand things unknown to the physical eye. During Spanish colonial times in New Mexico, from the 16th to the 19th centuries, *Ojos de Dios* (God's Eyes) were placed where people worked, or where they walked along a trail.

In other parts of the Americas, artisans weave complicated or variegated versions of the traditional *Ojos de Dios*, selling them as decorations or religious objects. There has also been a huge increase in the use of Ojos de Dios as an easy and fun craft for children.

The Ojo de Dios or God's eye is a ritual tool that was believed to protect those while they pray, magical object, and an ancient cultural symbol evoking the weaving motif and its spiritual associations for the Huichol and Tepehuan Americans of western Mexico. The Huichol or Wixaritari call their God's Eyes Tsikuri, which means "the power to see and understand things unknown." When a child is born, the central eye is woven by the father, then one eye is added for every year of the child's life until the child reaches the age of five. Original Tepehuan Crosses are extremely rare to come by. There are many that are being made for the tourist market, but they do not carry the same traditional and spiritual significance.



Luther is honored on February 18 with a commemoration in the Lutheran Calendar of Saints and in the Episcopal Calendar of Saints.

Luther went to study in Rome. There, he discovered that many of the leaders of the Catholic Church were dishonest and corrupt. People would pay them money to get into heaven, which Luther thought was wrong.

Luther made effective use of Johannes Gutenberg's printing press to spread his views. He even switched from Latin to German in his writing to appear to a broader audience.



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
