What does this mean?


In fact, God's kingdom comes on its own without our prayer, but we ask in this prayer that it may also come to us.

Shepherd's Voice

"The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." Mark 1:1

Dear God's beloved,

It's a new year! Are you excited? Have you made your New Year's resolutions yet? As a child I came up with brilliant (or unrealistic) New Year's resolutions like "Memorize 100 Japanese classical poems (There is a card game called *hyakunin ishu*, or 100 Classical Japanese Poems. Our family played this card game every new year. And I wanted to win this game by memorizing all 100 poems.) or "Eat healthy and exercise well." Most of my New Year's resolutions disappeared by the end of January, but once in a while I remembered and tried again in the Summer (and forgot them again in a month!).

The new year brings excitement. December 31 and January 1 are different by just a day, but somehow January seems to be different, starting something new-new year, new life, new hopes, new challenges, new dreams, and new learning opportunities. So for this year, 2021, I invite you to try reading the Gospel of Mark. Mark's gospel is short (only 16 chapters), and the story moves quickly. (Mark loves the word "immediately.") It is considered to be the earliest gospel to be compiled (Scholars say the Gospel of Mark was written around 70 C.E.). I like reading Mark not only because it is short and concise but also because Mark is a good story teller. My New Testament professor at seminary said that Mark's gospel was probably performed like a theater before it was compiled in a book. The Gospel of Mark is a good one to try. It is a simple, short, and passionate account about a man named Jesus, the Son of God, who brought the good news of God's reign to people who felt God was distant. And in its simple writings Mark provides room for questions and imagination. If you are like me who can easily forget New Year's resolutions within a month, Mark will be a good one to try. And if you forget some days to read, do not worry. We are in the year of Mark in the lectionary, which means that most of our Sunday readings will come from the Gospel of Mark. We will read together on Sundays! If you would like to explore more about the Gospel of Mark, there are plenty of good resources. (ex. the website Enter the Bible https://www.enterthebible.org offers basic outlines, background, and theological themes. If you'd like to read it like a story, you may check Mark as Story by David Rhoads, Joanna Dewey, and Donald Michie.) Reading the Bible keeps us centered in God. The more we explore God's stories, the more we grow in trusting God. Let's give it a try! Pr. Miho

Highlights from December Council Meeting

Call to Order: 6:30

Minutes were read by Secretary Cora Hudik for the October 22nd and November 12th phone council meetings.

Treasurer's Report: Jay Andrews gave the report. Monies were taken out of the revolving fund to meet the bills in October and November. There is a small amount left in the revolving account. Heating: \$270.36 Electric: \$139.01

A question was raised as to where the seasonal offering is distributed in the budget. Jay explained it goes toward current expenses.

• Pastor's Report: This was presented by Pastor Miho via speaker phone. She pointed out on the printed copy of the report that the Council Members had a few special additions: Bob Herman passed on the 9th and the funeral would be at future date of the following week. She asked the Council Members to contact their flock to update the list of who has internet service for the purpose of knowing what is the best way to contact when announcements need to be made. For those who don't have internet service how would the member want to be contacted: Snail mail/phone call/ or texting?

Next she asked that the Council Members would sign and mail Christmas postcards with the Christmas worship schedule printed on the card with some space for the Council Member to write a brief notation and sign. Address and postage will be on the postcard. This is to make a personal connection. These will be ready the week of the 14th of December. Pastor will inform council members when they can come by the church to pick the postcards up.

- Committee Reports:
- Worship: Christmas worship services will be on Facebook Live. There will be no in person services.
- Service Committee, the Barnabas/ Health & Wellness, report brought up the discussion of the Le-Win Food Pantry. How many families in the area are getting the benefit? Communities in Winslow, McConnell, Orangeville and Lena are served.
- Annual congregational meeting was discussed: Main question was Should it be held in January or not? By agreement of the Council Members present it was probably difficult to have it in January due to the mitigating orders that the State of Illinois put out regarding COVID-19. Pastor and Wayne will be attending the Zoom meeting hosted by the Northern Synod on Saturday. They will share with the council later. This will be discussed as it relates to the revision of the Good Shepherd Constitution/ By-laws. Can the date of annual congregational meeting be amended without the formal procedure as prescribed in the present Constitution/ by-laws? Discussion will continue to the next meeting.
- If the Annual Meeting is postponed, Don Weinand, Bari Raymer, Virgil Gordon and Billie Jo Runkle agreed to stay on Council at least until the Annual meeting.

Voice vote to adjourn passed and was followed by the Lord's Prayer. Next Meeting: 14, January 2021 at 6:30PM

Prayer Chain:


If you have a request for the Prayer Chain, please call the Church Office to submit your request at 815-369-5552. We are also looking for anyone who would like to join the prayer chain.

Are you looking for yarn, or are you getting ready for those winter knitting or crochet projects? If you are, the Piece Corps Quilters has extra yarn available for you.


We are in need of sheets, blankets or other sewing materials. If you have any of these items you can drop them off at the church office or Fellowship Hall. Thank you for your donations.

Grinches and Scrooges can't steal your 'Joy to the World'

In this time when we should be singing "Joy to the World," I wonder how many of us are feeling the joy right now. With COVID-19 infections, hospitalizations, and deaths on the rise, how can we sing "Joy to the World?" Social distancing and mass gathering restrictions in place make it difficult to celebrate.

With recommendations for limiting social and family gatherings, this Christmas season makes me think of the movie, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas," or even Ebenezer Scrooge in the Charles Dickens' novel, "A Christmas Carol." Neither the Grinch nor Scrooge saw anything joyful in Christmas. The Grinch sets out to ruin things for the people of Whoville, and Ebenezer Scrooge is a miser who despises Christmas. I think we could cast COVID-19 in either of those roles. Eventually, both Scrooge and the Grinch realize the joy of Christmas.

We, as Christians, have always celebrated with joy the birth of Jesus Christ. On Christmas Eve and the time following, we usually sing "Joy to the World" with exuberance in our worship. Unlike years past, this year, if we sing the well-loved hymn, it will mostly be in our homes or with others on Zoom. How can we be joyful when all the world seems to be hurting?

The Lord is Come

We only need to look to the second phrase of the hymn and the words, "the Lord is Come." Jesus Christ, our Lord, was born on Christmas Day. That thought alone should make us joyful and happy during these unprecedented times. Looking further at the words of this familiar hymn assures us that "the savior reigns" and "He rules the world with truth and grace." The words continue, "He comes to make his blessings flow far as the curse is found." No matter what befalls us, COVID-19, or some other calamity, we know Jesus was born in that manger, and he is our Messiah.

As we look back on this time of the Coronavirus in 2020, we may think about it as a curse. However, there is still joy to be found as we manage to worship in new and different ways, as we connect with our friends and neighbors remotely, as we share the joy of Christmas and the birth of Jesus Christ in whatever ways possible. Let us sing "Joy to the World" as we think about the many blessings we receive, even in time of a pandemic, and as we acknowledge that Christ is King!



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Blessing the Home at Epiphany by Wayne Zschech | Jan 1, 2019 | Uncategorized

Matthew writes that when the magi saw the shining star stop overhead, they were filled with joy. "On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother" (Matt. 2:10-11). In the home, Christ is met in family and friends, in visitors and strangers. In the home, faith is shared, nurtured, and put into action. In the home, Christ is welcome. Twelfth Night (Jan 5), Epiphany of Our Lord (Jan 6), or another day during the time after Epiphany offers an occasion for gathering with friends and family members for a blessing for the home. Someone may lead the greeting and blessing, while another person may read the scripture passage. Following an eastern European traditions, a visual blessing may be inscribed with white chalk above the main door; for example, 20 + CMB + 19. The numbers change with each new year. The three letters stand for either the ancient Latin blessing *Christe mansionem benedicat*, which means, "Christ bless this house," or the legendary names of the magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar).

The following is a simple Blessing for the Home. Families can use this and every year at Epiphany.

Greeting

May peace be to this house and all who enter here. By wisdom a house is built and through understanding it is established through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures. (Proverbs 24:3-4)

Readina

As we prepare to ask God's blessing on this household, let us listen to the words of scripture. Read John 1 verses 1-4, 14, and 16).

Inscription

This inscription may be made with chalk above the entrance: 20 + CMB + 21. Write the appropriate character while speaking the text

The magi of old, known as C Caspar M Melchior, and **B** Balthasar Followed the star of God's Son who came to dwell among us 20 two thousand 21 and twenty one years ago.

+ Christ bless this house,

+ and remain with us throughout the year.

Prayer of Blessing

O God, you revealed your Son to all people by the shining of a star. We pray that you bless this home and all who live here with your gracious presence. May your love be our inspiration, your wisdom our guide, your truth our light, and your peace our benediction; through Christ our Lord. Amen.


