


Set your clocks ahead, Sunday March 14, 2021 - Daylight Saving Time Starts

Sunday, March 14, 2021, 2:00am clocks are turned forward.

Do you know why time changes at 2:00am?

Michael Downing is the author of *Spring Forward: The Annual Madness of Daylight Saving Time, he* tells TIME. The reason Daylight Saving Time starts at 2 a.m., rather than midnight, is all thanks to the railroads: Amtrak, specifically. When the country first experimented with Daylight Saving Time in 1918 during World War I, there were actually no trains **that** left New York City at 2 a.m. on a Sunday. "Sunday morning at 2 a.m. was when they would interrupt the least amount of train travel around the country," Downing says.

March is Women's History Month!



Devotion—Celebrating Women by Volora Starr Butler

Women's History Month is a great time to take inventory of women's contributions, to celebrate what is good about women-past and present-and what is good about ourselves. Something wonderful happens when we study and contemplate the lives of women who have made extraordinary contributions to society.

Listen to the familiar litany of strong women from our past: Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth, Carrie Chapman Catt, all three were larger-than-life women who campaigned relentlessly for women's right to freedom, equality and full womanhood.

Let the names of others ring our as well. I think of Clara Barton, Civil War nurse and founder of the American Red Cross, and of Florence Nightingale, nurse during the Crimean War and public health reformer. Congressional Representative Patsy Mink shepherded the passage or Title IX in 1972 to promote educational equity and was an advocate for the poor. Mary McLeod Bethune advocated for the education of African Americans and Annie Sullivan, teacher of Helen Keller, was a gifted special educator. Investigative journalist Nellie Bly and novelist Pearl Buck come to mind as inspiring subjects for school essays and bulletin inserts on women of achievement.

Sally Ride and Mae Jemison were pioneering women astronauts. Constance Baker Motley, judge and civil rights attorney and Martha Wright Griffiths, activist for equal rights for women and minorities, left a wonderful legacy for all of us. Researcher and biochemist Florence Seibert made passable the first reliable tuberculin test, still used today, and Faye Glenn Abdellah was a nurse researcher who developed the first tested coronary care unit. Entrepreneur Madame C.J. Walker, who developed cosmetic products for African American women and philanthropist Lydia Moss Bradley, founder of the institution that later became Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois, provide still more examples of trailblazing spirits.

As time goes by and our litany grows longer, we need to keep reminding ourselves of the magnitude and impact of these women's actions and their connection to our lives today.

We also need to connect with biblical women they too. They too, made great contributions in shaping womanhood and society, and their lives give vivid examples of discipleship in action.

The circle of our litany is almost complete as we remember praying women like Hannah and Anna; worshiping women like Mary Magdalene and Mary of Bethany; women like Mary and Pricilla, who studied God's word; women like Martha and the Samaritan women at the well, who made they way for others to come and see Jesus; and Lois and Eunice, great teachers and mentors who passed on the faith. We still need trendsetters for service like Dorcas and Lydia, and faithful givers like Joanna and the other women mentioned in Luke 8, who provided for Jesus' followers "out of their resources."

But the litany is not complete until we have made our own contribution. That contribution is to call our the names of women from our personal lives who have given us a better view of ourselves and have been examples to us our grandmothers, mothers, aunts and sisters, our Sunday school teachers, friends and mentors.

Celebrating the lives of women connects us to a circle that is complete, yet never ending!

Good Shepherd Scholarship Applications for 2021



The criteria for eligibility are as follows:

- 1. Participating member of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.
- 2. Graduating senior presently enrolled in college, or a returning college student.
- 3. Full time student with a minimum of 12 credit hours.
- 4. Student entering an Associate or Bachelor degree program.
- 5. Thorough completion and timely return of application.
- 6. Adult student returning for courses toward certification, associates or bachelor degree.

Since 1997, seventy-two scholarships have been awarded.

Applications for 2021 scholarships will be available April 1, 2021 at the church office. They must be returned to the church office by April 30, 2021.

Recipients may not reapply for additional scholarships.

Amount of scholarship is not to exceed \$1000, and may be less than this amount as demand requires. Also offered is a \$200 award for adults returning for class work.

Greetings,

The Job Corp is hard at work and we are going out into the community and help make homes a little safer, a little warmer. We have expanded the Job Corp and are excited at what we can do. Already we have installed doors for one family and make a ramp/deck safer for an Tribal elder. She was so happy she danced on the ramp. The Job Corps is working hard to handle our ministries such as **sandwiches**, **blankets**, **hygiene kits** and maintaining the property. They are also preparing the Presbyterian church for worship and for Kid's Time.

Yes we are offering Worship services at the Presbyterian church. With our Presbyterian partners Rev. Asa Wilson and Pastor Dan Johnson are offering a service of Prayer and Word twice a month at the church. And we recently began worshiping at the Presbyterian at Makasan. We love being able to bring the word or God to the people with our actions and our words.

We are looking at how we can be most helpful to the Lakota people and with this in mind we are reaching out to our partners, new and old, to see what the people feel they need. In the meantime out partners relationships have expanded and we are excited to offer HOT showers with Lakota Hope's Shower trailer. We are working with other partners to provide hot food on a regular basis.

We are working with our **Kid's Time** Families bringing activities and snacks weekly, and have provided over 250 meals twice a month to the families. Additionally, thanks to people like you, we were able to bring them Christmas presents in the form of gift cards. We love being able to still serve the kids and their families but we are looking forward to having them in our expanded and renewed Kid's Time space.

The Energy Assistance matching Fund is helping to keep people warm this winter, we will match up to \$200.00 to pay for electric bills or to purchase propane. This service is truly welcomed by the Lakota people.

We realize that the COVID restrictions will continue to keep us from hosting groups this summer. We are exploring options to stay in touch. We are also looking at virtual book studies. If you can think of anything we can do to help, please let us know. I am open to a ZOOM discussion.

Again, thank you so much for your support of the people of Pine Ridge.

Hope Amid Pandemic

Taken from Gather Magazine, readers share what gives them hope in uncertain times.

The Cedar Rapids Community was hit by a derecho last August during the pandemic. A derecho is basically a land hurricane with straight line winds up to 112 mph. I live in an eight-unit condo with other retired women. None of us had the skill set needed to remove all

the trees that we lost, including two very large ash trees. Our insurance company said that it was an act of God, so it would not be covered. We'd just put on a new roof, and we were in the process of replacing siding due to a June hailstorm.

An ELCA congregation in town was facilitating clean-up work around Cedar Rapids. After I contacted them, immediately volunteers came out to our homes and moved most of the debris to the curb. But we still had the two large ash trees to deal with. Then I learned that my congregations, St. Andrew, was hosting volunteers from Rubicon, a nonprofit organization that helps communities after natural disasters. "Rubicon" refers to a river in Italy. The saying "crossing the Rubicon" means to irrevocably commit to a course of action. Six volunteers from the larger Rubicon group working in the city visited our condos good-natured, organized and competent, the spent the better part of two days helping us, in 90-plus degree heat. They cut and moved branches, limbs and parts of tree trunks for the city to pick up. These dedicated, committed people, most of who were retired military, law enforcement officers, firefighters and emergency medical technicians (EMTs), reminded me of the truth of the ELCA motto: God's work. Our hands.

It is time to order Easter Lilies




Deb will also introduce us to a book written by Juliet Cutler entitled "Among the Maasai".



Answer to Good Shepherd Trivia Question

The owners share of the instrument was immediately sold to the congregations for \$10.00

And now, here's the rest of the story;

Between August 1888 and November 1891 the question of fixing up the church was broached. The Ladies' Aid Society was on the cutting edge by pledging \$500 toward a fund to rebuild the present church or to erect a new building. On several occasions the Ladies' Aid took the initiative for making definite improvements in the church.

The Presbyterian Church graciously extended an invitation to Amity on April 13, 1891 to use their church building during the rebuilding of the edifice. Amity thankfully accepted the invitation. The congregation was to use the building each Sunday until 10:30 a.m. and on Sunday afternoons, as well as three evenings a week.

The building was rededicated November 22, 1891. The Rev. J.H. Menges of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania preached the service. The total cost of all the improvements was \$6,000.00.

During the time of the remodeling, another concern came before the church council. In 1889 it was brought to the attention of the Church Council that the bass violin used in the Sunday service orchestra was also being used in a local dance hall to provide music. The Council ordered the owner to either sell his share in the instrument to the church or to purchase the congregation's share, since this state of affairs could not be tolerated.

The owner's share of the instrument was immediately sold to the congregation for \$10.00.

Luther and Lutheranism

Martin Luther (1483-1546)

Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, "captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans."

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. "I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God." Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates."


What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote.


What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, 'Faith is God's work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times."

This discovery set Luther's life on a new course -both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed sales team came to the Wittenberg area in October, 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God's unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His 95 Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of *Indulgences* became the first of a life-long stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this life-giving promise from God, and all of life in church and society.

What does this mean?

In fact, God gives daily bread without our prayer, even to all evil people, but we ask in this prayer that God cause us to recognize what our daily bread is and to receive it with thanksgiving.

What then does "daily bread" mean?

Everything included in the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, fields, livestock, money, property, an upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.
