

Shepherd's Voice

When [the shepherd] has brought his own [sheep], he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. John 10:4

When I first read the Jesus the Good Shepherd passage in the Bible, I read the passage in a metaphorical sense: we, God's children, were sheep, and we knew the voice of Jesus. Growing up in an urban area, I had no encounter with sheep (or any of God's beautiful creatures except dogs, cats, goldfish, and roosters at school). I did not know that sheep knew the voice of shepherds until I visited Beth and Jerry's farm this spring. Those who know them, they are shepherds. They raise sheep. I do not know much about sheep but I enjoy watching them. So when I heard Beth talking about lambs being born, I begged if I could stop by and watch the lambs.

One beautiful chilly Sunday afternoon my husband and I drove to their farm. Jerry, the shepherd, took us to the barn where newly born lambs and the mamma sheep were hanging out (also with cats and calves). It was absolutely fun watching them. In a pen, lambs were bumping into each other, sucking mamma sheep's milk, and making a chorus of baa-ing. Jerry's presence made a huge difference. They were calm and peaceful. (In the past I sneaked in to their farm to take pictures of sheep. Oh my, the sheep were startled and they went in another direction.) They knew their shepherd was there. While I was thrilled watching sheep and lambs and cats and calves, Jerry picked up a lamb for us to pet. The lamb made a baa-ing voice, and all the sudden sheep on the right and left cried "Baaaaaa." I was surprised wondering, what's going on? Jerry said that the mamma sheep knew the voice of her lambs. And the grandma sheep also recognized the voices of their family lambs. Sheep know voices. Sheep hear the voices of their family and the shepherd.

Jesus tells us that Jesus is the Good Shepherd. He calls his sheep by name, and his sheep know his voice. During the season of Easter (remember, Easter is 50 days of the celebration of new life in Christ.), we are exploring God's call in worship. We read hymn verses which contain "call or calling" each Sunday. I thank Janis for gathering calling hymns for us. When I was reading the lyrics of these hymns, I was struck by how diligently God calls us to remember that God loves us, and call us to love our neighbors as Jesus has loved us. God does not give up on us. God never stops calling us to live in God's big love. Our God is relentless. Don't you see that God pours love into our hearts every day? There are too many tragedies in our society. Many people are hurting right now. Remember my friends, Jesus, the Good Shepherd, knows us and calls us by name to love. And Jesus is going ahead of us and reaching out those who are struggling this day. May the love of Good Shepherd transform us to become God's loving presence to every soul we meet today. Know Our Roots—History of Good Shepherd

We received this e-mail from Mr. Richard Stratton;

Friends, It was interesting to read that Rev. Eli(as) Fair was your first pastor, I know the name because he was in Somerset County, Pennsylvania, Prior to moving to Illinois. He had associations with a handful of congregations there. He is credited with organizing the first Lutherans in my hometown of Meyersdale. The union church shared by the Lutheran and Reformed congregations was given the name Amity. Alas, he ruffled some feather and did not leave under positive circumstances. Do you know any more about him?

We replied with the first 3 pages of Good Shepherd's history, which confirmed that Rev. Fair did not leave under positive circumstances.

The History of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church

When Northern Illinois became safe for settlement after the Blackhawk wars, many immigrants came west. Many of these people were of German decent from New York, Pennsylvania, and Ohio. Between 1840 and 1850 the population of Northern Illinois increased by 100%.

These immigrants came to Stephenson County seeking a home, new life, and a better day. There were two kinds of German immigrants, those that were second, third, or fourth generation Americans and those that had just arrived from the Old World with all the old German language, customs, and religious beliefs intact. The number of generations removed from Europe and its language and customs would be a great influence on the Lutheran Church in Lena.

In 1848 the Rev. Mr. Scherer, Itinerant State Missionary for the Illinois Synod, visited Stephenson County. He received \$4.00 in collection for the cause of Home Missions. He reported 100 Lutheran names in the county in 1849. In 1850 the Rev. George J. Donmeyer came to Stephenson County. He resided in Buena Vista and reached out to the Lutheran families in the county. When the Rev. Donmeyer arrived he found there were seven preaching stations in the county. By the Synod meeting in 1851, Rev. Donmeyer had five organized congregations including Salem Church, Waddams Grove; and Unity in Waddams Grove Township. He also had three preaching stations, but as the pastors only had to report the figures as to the number of the faithful reached and not the locations, it is impossible to know there these places were.

In 1856 Rev. Donmeyer was able to organize two churches, one in Buena Vista and one in Lena. The church in Buena Vista was organized with 18 members and the Lena Church has 31 members. The Rev. Eli Fair would supply the church as pastor when Rev. Donmeyer was away to other preaching stations. The Lena church met in the homes of the church families or the Old Stone School House located at the corner of Lena and Franklin Streets. The School House was torn down in 1902.

Rev. Eli Fair came to Stephenson County and the Northern Illinois Synod in late November of 1856. He resigned the Berlin Parish of the Alleghany Synod in Pennsylvania on November 6, 1856. His decision to come to Northern Illinois was not a surprising one. As information is exchanged between the different Synods today, so it was also exchanged in 1856. The Synod reported that the "fields were ripe for harvest" and that the "laborers were few." The interesting part is why Rev. Fair left Pennsylvania. He had been serving a union congregation of Lutheran and Reformed. Rev. Fair was very zealous for Missions and revivals. After a tactless affair in 1854 over Sabbath-breaking, he was asked to leave the congregation at pistol point. The Alleghany Synod refused to allow the congregation to withdraw from the Synod. Instead they sent a new pastor to replace Rev. Fair. These facts are important to note as they play a greater roll in the organization of the Lutheran congregation in Lena.



The diakonia[™] Program is a two-year process of lay spiritual formation consisting of 12 courses, 6 per academic year. Each course is 5 sessions in length and meets weekly on Zoom for a 3 hour class. Assignments and reading relate directly to your life and ministry (within family, parish, neighborhood, and vocation), giving you a solid background of the topic. You work at your own level, and assignments reflect the understanding that students are already busy in their families, jobs, and parish. Typically, students average approximately 2 to 5 hours of studies per week in addition to class time. The goal of the diakonia program is to help you discover your God-given gifts, strengthen your faith and discern your purpose within your congregations, synods, and the church-wide body of Christ. Through the diakonia experience, you'll gain a better under-standing of theology and your relationship to God, helping you bear fruit as a light of Christ in your community and beyond. New courses begin every 5 weeks, and you can jump in at any time. Not sure, come to a few classes and see if diakonia is for you. 





What is the oldest known piece of music?

If you answered the "Hurrian Hymn No. 6," an ode to the goddess Nikkal you are correct.

The history of music is as old as humanity itself. Archaeologists have found primitive flutes made of bone and ivory dating back as far as 43,000 years, and it's likely that many ancient musical styles have been preserved in oral traditions. When it comes to specific songs, however, the oldest known examples are relatively more recent. The earliest fragment of musical notation is found on a 4,000-year-old Sumerian clay tablet, which includes instructions and tunings for a hymn honoring the ruler Lipit-Ishtar. But for the title of oldest extant song, most historians point to "Hurrian Hymn No. 6," an ode to the goddess Nikkal that was composed in cuneiform by the ancient Hurrians sometime around the 14th century B.C. The clay tablets containing the tune were excavated in the 1950s from the ruins of the city of Ugarit in Syria. Along with a near-complete set of musical notations, they also include specific instructions for how to play the song on a type of nine-stringed lyre.




