

Dear God's beloved,

Summer seems to have passed the baton to Fall. Students are back to school in Lena, and the football and volleyball games will start soon. The Fall Festival is around the corner (Mark your calendar! It will be on September 10-11). Several people began mentioning the "f word" (frost). I am not keen on saying good bye to summer but I guess it's time to cherish summer memories. Did you have a good summer? What are your highlights from this summer? Some of my highlights of this summer were corn, tomatoes, beans, pop up lilies, zucchini, peppers, broccoli, hydrangea, and candies. All of them came from the hands of friends who generously shared from their gardens, their yards, and their candy jars. These were small gifts, but they brightened my day (especially on my blue, crabby days). They were signs of caring, love, and joy.

This summer we read John chapter 6 in worship. It was the story of feeding 5000 plus crowd with 2 fish and 5 loaves of bread. This feeding story appears in all four gospels. (Thanks, Rene for pointing that out!) Each account tells unique details of the story. For instance, Matthew tells us about the presence of women and children at the feast, and John tells us that a boy shared 2 fish and 5 loaves of barley bread. I learned this year that barley bread was commoner's (or poor people's) bread. And Jesus made this humble offering into a joy feast. Once Jesus blessed these small gifts and handed them to the crowd, they became a sign of God's love. All who ate were satisfied and had 12 baskets of leftovers. They became abundant blessings of God.

Small gifts can change the lives of many. Offering a short extra drive to see the growing corn in the fields may brighten one's lonely day. Sharing sweet peaches with a friend brings joy. Delivering flowers from home makes shut-ins smile. God makes our small offerings into signs of abundant love of God. And we need God's abundant love in our society right now. As you may be aware, many people, young or old or in-between, are living with heavy burdens emotionally, economically, physically, and spiritually. Many are feeling overwhelmed and lonely. Mental illness is a serious concern. God can use our small gifts to reach out to those who are struggling. As a church, we are going to collect items for the food pantry and school supplies at the Fall Festival hospitality tent. We may not be able to solve all the problems in society, but we can be the boy and his family in the story to share our joy and prayer to the folks through our meager gifts of non-perishable food and personal hygiene items and notebooks and crayons. With the blessings of Jesus they will become a sign of God's abundant love to the world.

Friendship Center



Highlights from July 15th Church Council Meeting

Secretary's Report: The minuets of the July 15th, 2021 Church Council Meeting were reviewed and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Jay reported that he had been in contact with the bank about the Payroll Protection Program Loan. We have the money as of last month, he is now checking what is needed next to get the loan forgiven. Jay is keeping in close contact with the bank to get this done at the appropriate time. Jay will keep the Council updated on this

progress.

Heating: \$464.03 Electric: \$134.55

A question was asked if the heating bill was a little high yet? Jay noted that the last billing period paid was from April 8 to May 7. Wayne Kurth noted that the boilers were not shut off until last may and that is why the bill still seems to be so large. Jay also reported that the budget is running \$3000.00 behind needed funds.

Pastor's Report: Pastor reported that she had officiated at the wedding of Brianna Andrews and Demetrio Velazco. It was a good service. Pastor reported that she received an email from the ELCA Open Door Grant. We did not get the grant, however they offered a \$50.00 honorarium when a survey is completed later this year. She also noted that the Lena Drug Store donated 36 nail clippers for the LWR Persona Care Kits. We still need 19 soaps and 18 combs. Under Event/Activities and Children/Youth in Pastor's report a couple of dates were questioned. After looking them over it was determined that they were the wrong dates and corrected. Kristy Patterson moved to accept the Pastor's Report with corrections. Coralyn Hudik seconded the motion. Pastor has contacted Pastor Karen Tews of Prince of Peace to take care of any Pastoral calls during her vacation of July 27 to 30, 2021.

Committee Reports:

- **Stewardship Committee:** Coralyn Hudik reported that there will be a gathering at her farm west of Lena for July 25, 2021 for a fellowship time of the group "Never to Young". She also noted there will be other activities coming up in the future.
- Learning and Youth Committee: Kristy Patterson noted that Confirmation was going well. The group had a trip out to the Lena Drive Inn the other Sunday. A good time was had by all.
- **Service Committee:** Good Shepherd was at the Lena Food Pantry on June 26, 2021. Workers are needed for the Food Pantry on August 28.
- **Finance Committee:** Committee Chair, Way Kurth reported that the Finance Committee is looking to have a meeting in mid September. Date to be set later.
- **Property Committee:** Committee Chair, Tim Gordon reported tht the Property Committee will be meeting on Monday evening, July 26, 2021.
- Men's Group: Troy Doubler noted that the Men's Group will be singing during Worship Service on July 18, 2021 and that they would be serving ice cream sundaes and root beer floats during Fellowship Hour. On August 15th, the Men's Group will be hosting a cook out and in October they will have their steak fry.

Some ideas for God's Work Our Hands include helping at the Lena Cemetery, someone has asked to have their gutters cleaned, getting the Youth involved doing possible sidewalk art and possible other projects. There is a need of at least 18 volunteers to make this work. There will be sack lunches provided for the workers. There will also be consideration of what Covid restriction will be at that time. The date is under consideration at this time and whether it will be a two day project or not. Troy will pe putting up a sign up sheet by the ramp soon.
- **Fall Festival:** We will again have a booth at the Fall Festival this year. More details to come. Next Meeting: August 19, 2021 at 6:30pm.



Is This the Same Person?

Lord, I'm just a spring chicken. I'm only 81. But it's tough when I see things I used to do. I can't even try to do them now. In days gone by, I used to leap out of bed. Now, I ask instead "Am I the same person?" I wonder a lot about that.

Passage

You shall love your neighbor as yourself. Mark 12:31

Perspective

Are we ever the same person as we were the day before? Likely not. Philadelphia's Franklin Institute once featured a facial time travel exhibit. While looking into the viewer at an image of your face, you turned a dial to watch your face progressively age on a TV screen. It was quite a time-trip!

How ever-changing is our body image across the age spectrum from birth to death's door! Such changes are often so gradual that we're slow to appreciate them from inside our own skin. But we are sure to take notice when our body or brain no longer serves our will as it once did.

As we adjust to changes in our appearance, physical abilities and mental capacity, we may also undergo an attitude adjustment. When younger and more able-bodied, it was easier to emotionally and physically distance ourselves from the aged or physically challenged. But in time, we may become the one who trips, falls, breaks a bone, and cries out, "How could this have happened?"

These unwelcome calamities collapse the distance between "us" and "them." In accepting a more vulnerable self-images, our empathy grows for those we once identified as "them." "Them" becomes "us," and at once our heart goes out to others and to ourselves.

Practice

How have your own troubles sensitized you toward the troubles of others? Put that sensitivity to use by reaching out to someone you once avoided due to his or her infirmities

Daily Bread


Moses said to them, "it is the bread that Lord has given to you to eat."

words. Our hope is to make them smile! Questions? Contact the church office or Pr. Miho.







Presence and Peace

Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." John 20:26

Doubting God's presence is part of the process of faith. When Thomas, one of the disciples, doubted Jesus gave him the assurance he needed. The evening after Jesus had risen from the dead, he appeared to some disciples who were gathered behind closed doors. They were afraid, grieving, and hiding; two days earlier, they had witnessed Jesus' death. Because Thomas was not with them that night, when others told him about Jesus' appearance, he did not believe them, saying that he would need to see for himself. A week later, Jesus appeared again, and Thomas saw the risen Lord with his own eyes.

Like Thomas, you may feel doubtful about Christ's presence. The loss of home, friends, or family may make it difficult to see through your pain and recognize Christ standing in the middle of it. Yet, Jesus comes to you as he did to the first disciples. Through doors that have been closed by heartache, loss, and fear, he comes to stand wit you. He steps through grief and anxiety to bring you peace.

Lord Jesus, help me believe that you are with me and trust in your word of peace.

Amen.




