Council Meeting Highlights

September 15, 2022

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Council met on September 15, 2022 for their regular monthly meeting. President Wayne Kurth called the meeting to order at 6:35pm.

Secretary's Report: The August 18, 2022 Secretary's report was reviewed. Having no additions or corrections. Secretary's report was approved.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jay Andrews presented the Treasurer's Report. He noted that on the report, that Mission Support and Pastor's benefits and pension were payments for both July and August. There are no outstanding bills at this time but the Current Account is still \$3000 behind. The checking is good but offerings are still running low.

Electric Bill - \$178.03 Gas Bill - \$344.54

Treasurers report was approved.

Vicar's Report: Vicar Thomas Mosbo reported that having been her four weeks he has made 9 visits, given communions to 8 members, and lead Sunday Worship Service. He is trying to integrate into the Church and Community by visiting the Quilting Ladies, attending Bible Study, attending Fall Festival and sitting in the Church Tent as well as updating the Church's visitors pamphlet.

Women's offerings: a brief history

Women's offerings: a brief history The idea of collecting donations in small offering boxes goes back to the very early 1800s, when women formed "mite" or "cent" societies to raise money.

Mite boxes were given out as fundraising tools to collect pennies for the support of church projects and foreign missionaries. These women-led cent societies, platforms for social activism as well as evangelism in the 19th century, published their own literature, Bible studies and other materials advocating around issues such as child labor, literacy and prison reform. In time, larger missionary and ladies aid societies developed out of this work because there was such an overwhelming demand not only for foreign missionary support but for support at home. These women's groups funded needs in their local churches as well as local community projects. Their capacity for fundraising was acknowledged and generally welcomed by their congregations. The earliest American Lutheran women's missionary society was founded in New York in 1837 to financially support the education and ordination of foreign missionaries from their synod. In 1879, the first national American Lutheran women's missionary society, the General Synod's Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, was founded. The original reason behind the creation? Funds were needed to financially support two young women who wanted to be foreign missionaries but were denied funding by the Board of Missions. A national women's structure was born! For this new organization, supporting missionary work both abroad as well as in the United States was seen as essential, and so missionaries were assigned to both foreign and domestic locations. For example, because of the support of the General Synod's Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, a young pastor named Rev. C.W. Heisler was sent as a missionary to Los Angeles, California. He helped establish First Lutheran in 1887, which is now the oldest ELCA congregation in Los Angeles. Less than a decade after the national missionary society was established, the wide-reaching impact of women's giving to the mission and ministries of the Lutheran church was evident.



Lesser known Commemorations

Martin, Bishop of Tours, died November 11, 397

Also known as Martin the Merciful, he was the third bishop of Tours. Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the army at age fifteen. One winter day, a beggar approached Martin for aid, and he cut his cloak in half and gave a portion to the beggar. Later, Martin understood that he had seen the presence of Christ in that beggar, and this ended his uncertainty about Christianity. He soon asked for his release from his military duties. He was charged with cowardice and was imprisoned instead, but in response to the charge, he volunteered to go unarmed to the front of the troops. His superiors planned to take him up on the offer, but before they could, the invaders sued for peace, the battle never occurred, and Martin was released from military service After his release from prison he began preaching, particularly against the Arians. In 371 he was elected bishop of Tours. As bishop he developed a reputation for intervening on behalf of prisoners and heretics who had been sentenced to death.
