Highlights from November Council Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Council was called to order by President Wayne Kurth at 6:30pm on November 17, 2022.

- **Secretary's report**: The Secretary's report for October 20, 2022 was reviewed. A motion to approve the October 21, 2021 meeting minuets as presented, motion approved.
- **Treasure's Report:** Jay Andrews presented the Treasurer's Report. The income is still running behind the budget for the year. The Council was reminded that a deficit in the budget was anticipated for the year. The current accounts are about \$4,600. behind for the month while the overall budget is \$22,500 behind.

Heating: \$696.04 Electric: \$148.59

Treasures report was approved.

- Vicar's Report: Vicar Thomas Mosbo presented his report. Vicar has provided pastoral care in person and on the phone to members and visited members who have been in the hospital. Vicar attended the Tuesday morning Bible Study and the Friendship Club dinner as well as conducted the Sunday Morning Worship services. Vicar Mosbo noted that he will be meeting with Bishop Stacie Fidler on Monday, November 21, 2022. Vicar's report was accepted as presented.
- Committee Reports:
- **Stewardship Committee**: The "Welcome to Lena" pot luck for Vicar Thomas and Coral Mosbo went very well. Good food and fellowship were shared by all in attendance.
- Learning and Youth Committee: Sunday School for all ages is not going very well. There have been three students and a couple of adults one Sunday and only a couple of adults the other Sundays. Looking for ideas and suggestions as to how to proceed in the future. The youth Christmas Program is being planned for December 18, 2022, during the Sunday Worship Service. It will be a program of narration and song of the season.
- **Finance Committee:** The Finance Committee will be meeting after Thanksgiving to work on the new budget for 2023.
- **Property Committee:** Part of the gutter guards are done. Waiting for the company to get a lift to finish the job. Wayne Kurth has worked on the boiler motors and currently everything is working again.
- Facebook/Website Committee: It has been noticed that the Website is in need of being updated.
- **Men's Group:** The Men's Group will be singing again on December 4, 2022 at morning worship service.

All Committee Reports were approved.

• Old Business: The Constitution Committee met and went over the concerns of the Church Councils review of their draft Constitution. They also had a new model Constitution from the Synod with the new revisions from the Synod Assemble. The committee presented their new draft for the Church Councils consideration. After reviewing the draft and some discussion a motion to send the current revised version of the Church Constitution to the Synod for their appraisal. Motion approved.

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Highlights from November Council Meeting

Old Business:

• **Vicar Thomas Mosbo's Contract:** Vicar Thomas Mosbo will be traveling to meet with Bishop Stacie Fidlar on Monday, November 21, 2022. He hopes o get more information about a contract and possible Internship Program here at Good shepherd. He will report back what he learns.

• New Business:

- Review of the Mailing List: It was suggested that due to the cost of postage that the current Newsletter mailing list be reviewed. After review and discussion, it was decided to leave the list as it is for now.
- **Endowment Funds:** The semi annual Rent Support for the Lena Food Pantry is due to be paid. A motion was made to end \$600 to the Lena Food Pantry for the Good Shepherd's portion of the Rent Support and to take the money from the Lucille Baker Endowment Fund Interest. Motion approved.

It is also time for the annual disbursement of the Endowment Fund Interest to support the Mission Work of the Church. Following is a list of the organizations that funds will be disbursed to:

Motion made to approve the disbursement of the funds to the above listed organizations. Motion approved.

• New Christmas Tree: It has been suggested that it may be time for a new Christmas tree. The current tree was purchased in 1999 and it's 23 years old. There are some of the lights that will no longer light and the tree must be tied up so that it does not lean to one side. There is a tree at Wal-Mart for \$340. A member of the congregation has offered money toward the purchase of a new tree and the rest of the money will come from the Memorial Fund. After discussion a motion was made to purchase a new tree, motion approved.

Having no other business, the meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting will be on December 16, 2021 at 6:30pm.

The Secret Life of Plants

What rescuing leafy captives from a store taught me By Susaw Sparks

When I want to lift myself our of the dumps, I go to the Astor Place Kmart in the East Village of New York City. Sure I could default to other solutions, like walking around Central Park, watching a rerun of "Chopped," or on a really bad day, breaking out the French onion soup packet, sour cream and Ruffles.

But my first choice is the Kmart.

Specifically, I favor an area in the far back corner of the Kmart basement. Devoid of windows or natural light, it has a back wall of clear glass that faces the dark, dungeon-like tunnel of the Number 6 subway train. There, you will find the most unexpected of things—a plant nursery.

Sprouting in this dreary prison are woven Ficus trees, begonias, African violets, scheffleras, Christmas cacti and spindly spider plants. I feel so sorry for those little plants. They struggle to grow in their stale, lifeless chamber. And if the fake light isn't bad enough, every five minutes the train roars by, shaking them to the base of their wee roots.

That's why occasionally, I head to Kmart to stage a prison break for a few lucky leafy inmates, so that they might recover in my home-or, given my gardening abilities, die in peace. But at least they have a chance. And that's all we as humans want, too.

Our environment is not so different from that of the plants in that Kmart basement. We live surrounded by toxicity, in places where we are often denied light, love, and sustenance, places where we can be shaken to our roots by unforeseen circumstances.

Maybe you're facing a bully at work, or dealing with a difficult person in your family. Or maybe you're in the middle of a divorce or losing a loved one. Many people are denied sustenance these days due to the skyrocketing price of food. Others are deprived of basic dignities due to racism and hatred. One of the most tragic examples is our brothers and sisters in the Ukraine who are surrounded by the toxicity of war-shaken to their roots by circumstances beyond their control.

It would be easy to give up, in the face of such obstacles. But then I think of those wee plants which continue to fight, use whatever they must to stay alive, and stretch their roots and strain their stems to convert even the tiniest bit of artificial light into energy and life.

One reason I love rescuing them is the tiny plastic tab that peeks out of each plant's pot. On it is an image of what that plant could grow into if it receives proper light and care. It is an image of the plants true potential.

We all have that same divine potential-that metaphorical plastic tab, embossed with the image or our best self. Sometimes we, too, need a reminder of what that looks like so we don't loose our way-something that's all to easy to do in this world.

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Our true potential has nothing to do with what anyone else's "plant tab" looks like. Consider the marigolds in the Kmart. They don't try to grow into another kind of flower, like a rose. They don't question whether they are paid enough. Their only quest it to grow into that one unique images on their plastic tab and evolve into their divine potential.

Nor does an experience define who we are, war, hatred, hunger, poverty-all of these represent human situations, not the human soul.

I understand this, as a breast cancer survivor and a comedian. During my battle with cancer, I found that laughing in a place of pain was the quickest way to remind myself of my inherent worth, even while I was immersed in a toxic experience that shook me to my roots. Humor in that moment, made me realize something: While cancer could possibly defeat me, it would never define me.

Joan Chittister, a Benedictine nun and author, once said that we have the potential to be the human beat of the heart of God. So don't waste that gift. Don't give up the fight just because you find yourself in an unhealthy, unsupportive place. Each one of us has divine potential. We just need to stretch out minds, bodies and souls toward the light.

The next time you are feeling low, consider a little wisdom from the basement of the Astor Place Kmart. Find a place in you community where you can literally rescue and imprisoned plant. If so, remember to take time for joy and laughter. That time to remind yourself of your inherent worth even while surrounded by toxic influences.

Most of all, remember that are many others out there who feel the same way. Just as I rescued plants from the Kmart, consider "rescuing" another person who might be trapped in a toxic place by showering them with light and love. You could reach out to a friend in need. Or perhaps you might volunteer at a homeless shelter or nursing home. Maybe you involve your self in the important work of racial reconciliation and find a way to support the Ukrainian relief efforts. Whatever methods you choose, reaching out to others can do wonders to help them-and you-grow.


