2023 Northern Illinois Synod Synod Assembly Recap

These words ushered in the 2023 Northern Illinois Synod Assembly, held June 16-17, 2023, at Augustana College in Rock Island. The Assembly's theme, "Be the Body," guided the hard, hope-filled, and holy work of this synod. Bishop Stacie Fidlar of the Northern Illinois Synod took the stage, inviting Rostered Ministers, lay voting members, and visitors of the assembly to rediscover what it means to be the body of Christ in the now and not yet.

The assembly was gathered as the body of Christ and conducted the business of the assembly, including passing the 2024 Northern Illinois Synod budget and electing members to Synod Council and various committees. The assembly passed two resolutions: R-1: Growing in Faith: The diakoniatm Program for 2023 Northern Illinois Synod Assembly and R-2: Memorialize Churchwide to update the Social ment on Abortion. The assembly also approved updated Compensation Guidelines for Rostered Ministers and approved synod constitution changes from the 2022 Churchwide Assembly.

Over the course of our assembly, those gathered engaged in worship experiences cultivated with congregations in mind, with the intent and hope that these worship services will be resources congregations can use throughout the year. Friday afternoon, Bishop Stacie Fidlar proclaimed the word during our Festival Worship, "Beloved ones, can you see it? God is about to, is always, doing a new thing. God was not done with Eli or the people of Israel. God was not done with the work of Jesus or the disciples. And God is definitely not done with us." Bishop Fidlar's sermon was a powerful reminder that God is at work in the here and now— we are being called to be open to where and how God is working in the now and not yet.


Outside of worship, the assembly engaged with our guest speaker, the Rev. Dr. Char Rachuy Cox. Rev. Cox is the Director of the Nourishing Vocation Project through the Lutheran Center for Faith, Values, and Community at St. Olaf College. Rev. Cox is a familiar face in our synod as our presenter at the Congregational Resourcing Event in March. Rev. Cox, and colleague Rev. Peter Carlson Schattauer, Associate Director of the Lutheran Center for Faith, Values, and Community at St. Olaf College, led the gathering through two breakout sessions. These breakout sessions explored each person's vocation and how we might live into our role in the body of Christ. The conversations also guided congregations to discern how our church is called to Be the Body, together.

New to this year's assembly was the Ministry Fair on Friday evening. This time together in Gavle Hall was a wonderful celebration of the various ministries throughout and connected with the synod. Those gathered celebrated milestones and ministries of Rostered Ministers and congregations. We capped off the evening with Augustana College's noteworthy strawberry shortcake. Prior to ending the Synod Assembly, Bishop Stacie Fidlar installed the called staff of the synod. The Rev. Jennifer Beamsley, the Rev. Josh Ebener, the Rev. Julie Monnard, and the Rev. Mack Patrick were welcomed and installed as Assistants to the Bishop. These leaders were called with a particular set of gifts that help the synod enter into a new era of ministry under Bishop Fidlar's leadership. Also, the entire assembly, from pastors and deacons to lay members, received the following blessing: "God bless your openness to a process of becoming together. For these are gifts of God. And so are you."

Highlights from the May 18th Council Meeting

- Agenda: The Agenda for the meeting was reviewed. Having no additions or corrections, the Agenda was approved.
- Secretary's Report: The Secretary's Report was presented to the Church Council for review. Having no additions or corrections. The Secretary's Report was approved.
- **Treasurer's Report:** Treasurer Jay Andrews presented his report to the Council. The May offerings to date have been low and the current account is running behind. Gas Bill: \$914.81 Electric Bill \$206.21
- Vicar's Report: Vicar Thomas Mosbo reported that he is continuing to visit members, prepare Worship Service and attend meetings and gatherings. He also noted that he is half way through his Internship and that the Internship Committee met with Rev. James Mehltretter and Vicar Thomas Mosbo to do a mid-term evaluation. Vicar Thomas also noted that he would be focusing on the areas of adult education, stewardship and working with other churches in the community as part of his internship duties.

Committee Reports:

Worship and Music: The Worship and Music Committee met on May 1, 2023. Highlights of the meeting include: Recognizing graduates from the congregation.

Summer Liturgy will be ELW Setting 10.

Request favorite hymns from the congregation for the summer.

Summer Service at Darci Meier's home sometime in August.

Chime and Vocal Choir practice will begin in September.

Communion will continue on the first and third Sundays of the month.

- **Property Committee:** The Property Committee met on April 24, 2023. Wayne Kurth reported that Pearl City Seamless Gutters were waiting for warmer weather when they would have a full crew to finish the gutters. Molitor Plumbing still needs to replace a valve on the boiler, but the motor is working. Discussed adding a new sign at the front of the church to the Memorial List. Looking into the cost of an electronic sign. Stump Busters were at the church to remove the stump from the tree that was taken down.
- Scholarship Committee: The Scholarship Committee reported that they had no applications this year.

Memorial Committee: The Memorial Committee has received a memorial designated for the choir.

Men's Group: The Men's Group will be working on the shed.

Having no other Committee Reports, the Committee Reports were approved.

New Business: There was no new business before the Council.

Having no other business before the Church Council, The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer at 7:50 pm.



54 of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence were Christians, 27 held theology degrees. Many went on to form Bible societies.





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St. Thomas Day, July 3rd

Saint Thomas Day commemorates the life and works of Saint Thomas the Apostle, one of the twelve disciples of Jesus Christ. The day honors the saint's devotion to spreading the Gospel and his missionary trips to various parts of the world, including India. The day is significant to both the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches and is observed by numerous cultural and religious communities worldwide.
