"We need to listen to people who are hurt"

When Sherry Bryant's 22-year-old son Todd died by suicide in 1993, she felt her congregation at the time wasn't a safe place to talk about her loss and grief, largely because of old belief systems—especially within the church—about the "sin" and stigma of suicide.

Bryant and her husband, both mental health professionals, found help in a community support group that accompanied them through the days, weeks and years after their son's death.

A member of Our Saviour Lutheran Church in Naperville, Ill., Bryant said that when her son died, she met another woman in her community who was a pioneer in suicide prevention and mental health.

Bryant wants communities of faith to learn about how to talk about suicide and mental health. She believes that, for too long, those communities have viewed such discussions as "scary and dangerous." She said research has changed what she was taught in graduate school in the 1980s.

"What research tells us in the last 30 years [is that] when people at risk can talk, they feel listened to," she said. "Ordinary people need to be trained to talk about suicide or mental health, to reach out to each other. Those kinds of ideas about how to ask someone if they're depressed and to use the right words—depression, anxiety—to ask people openly how they're feeling. And if they don't want to answer, that's OK, but be open to reaching out and saying those kinds of words."

She said the ELCA's social messages <u>about suicide and mental health</u> should guide churches in talking about these issues.

The ELCA social message on suicide prevention, adopted by the Church Council in 1999 and updated in 2021 with new statistics and resource information, includes both a theological understanding of suicide and practical resources for congregations, rostered ministers and other leaders.

The message emphasizes that life is a precious gift from God and the churchwide organization explains suicide as the "tragic brokenness of living that some experience as a torment without hope." It reminds church members to share life's burdens, especially when it might be easier to not engage with someone who lives in despair.

"We have to not be freaked out about tough things," Bryant said. "If the churches don't talk about it, we appear to be scared about these issues. We need to listen to people who are hurting."

Bryant said that when her son died, the person who walked with her family most faithfully was a lay congregation member—a Stephen Ministries volunteer. Other congregation members had trouble talking about the suicide, but "our Stephen minister, she followed us through the years. There were no magic words, just ordinary people being with ordinary people."

The local and regional organizations constituting the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline are staffed by such ordinary people, and they're having an impact, Bryant said, adding, "The volunteers have a stake. They've lost someone or have had their own mental health issues. There is so much need for people to be listened to. It's the thing that's made a difference."

Today a three-digit national suicide crisis line, 988, connects people experiencing suicidal crisis or mental -health-related distress with the care and support they need. The National Suicide Hotline Designation Act was signed into law in 2020, and as of 2022, all phone companies and text-messaging providers were required to route all calls and text messages to 988 to the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline.

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Where did our quilts go??

This year the Piece Corps made 600+ quilts. Most quilts go to Lutheran World Relief, some quilts are donated or purchased locally; 14 Lap Robes to Monroe Clinic Hospital, Barb Dahl received 23 quilts and 7 blankets, Holy Cross Catholic Church of Stockton took 27 quilts and 26 bath towels to Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota, Veterans Pantry received fitted sheets and bath towels. Each and every Wednesday morning-for 49years, the members of Piece Corps meet at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Fellowship Hall from 8:00am to 11:30am to assemble quilts. There are so many people who help make this ministry possible: the sewers, fabric cutters, ironers, quilt tiers, quilt binders, those who supply us with donations of fabric, batting, thread, and money, and finally– a special thank you to Beth, Shirley, Donna, Cindy, Genise and Jerry Martin those who helped pack-up and transport the quilts to Monroe, Wisconsin and load them on a semi truck so they get to the people who need them.

Each year, on Quilt Sunday, the church is draped with quilts. We thank God that He has given us work to do that impacts so many others. We will never know all the people who benefit from our quilts; but we know God's Love and Work is never done; and so each year we strive to do our best.

Our Quilt Ministry and Piece Corps had another very successful year. <u>600+</u> quilts were made this year. Since 1974 (49years) a total of 19,510 quilts have been made and sent. We do keep score! Thank you to everyone for your help and support. None of this would be possible without the help of many, many hands, lots of donations, and God's Love and Prayers.

Highlights from August 24th Church Council Meeting

Those in attendance were: Virgil Gordon, Dale Gullickson, Donna Gullickson, Coralyn Hudik, Janis Kurth, Darci Meier Vicar Thomas Mosbo and treasurer Jay Anderws.

Absent were Nakoah Cornwell, Jonathon Kurth and Anna Patterson.

Having Vice President Virgil Gordon arrive to the meeting, Secretary Janis Kurth turned the over seeing of the meeting to Vice President Virgil Gordon.

- Secretary's Report: The Secretary's Report was presented. There were a couple of typing errors noted, these will be corrected. Secretary's report was approved.
- **Treasurer's Report:** Jay Andrews presented the Treasurer's Report. The currant account is still running behind. Overall, the balance sheet is looking bad too. Treasurer Jay Andrews noted that it was getting time to look over Vicar's Insurance plan and other possible upcoming changes. Gas bill was \$165.10, Electric bill was \$142.87.

Treasurer's Report was approved.

Vicar's Report: Vicar Thomas Mosbo reported that in addition to his regular monthly duties; visiting shut-ins, presiding at worship, preaching, attending meetings, and other church functions; he was also working on Adult Vacation Bible School. Vicar Thomas noted that the attendance at "AVBS" ranged 10 to 16 participants each evening. A significant portion of the regular Sunday morning worshipers.

Just as with children's VBS, there was singing, refreshments, crafts and Bible study. The Bible study was on different prominent Old Testament stories.

Vicar Thomas also noted that his internship will officially be over at the end of September. He is talking to the Synod as to what comes next. The Synod did advise that they will extend his license through December 2023. Vicar's report was approved.

Committee Reports:

- Worship and Music Committee: The Committee will be having a meeting on August 28, 2023.
- Stewardship Committee: There will be a Pot-luck dinner and hymn sing starting at 12:00 noon on Sunday, September 10, 2023.
- **Property Committee:** The Property Committee had a meeting on August 14, 2023 and sent a proposal to the Church Council. The Property Committee would like to up date how the sump pump in the elevator pit is discharged. They talked to Molitor Plumbing and got a quote of \$3,000. for the project. During Council discussion on the proposal, the Council was wondering if the Village of Lena was contacted to be sure that this project would be within Village ordinances. The vote on the project was tabled until the Property Committee could get the answer from the Village of Lena. Motion was made to sent the proposal back to the Property Committee to check if this would be in compliance with the Village ordinances. Motion was approved.
- **Memorial Committee**: The Choir is in need of new music. The music will be paid for from some small memorials in the Memorial Fund.

All Committee Reports were approved.

Old Business



New Business:

- Fall Festival: It was recommended to continue with the Hospitality Tent at the Fall Festival. A suggestion of having a bake sale with the Hospitality Tent might be nice. After discussion, it was decided not to have bake sale items with the tent due to Health Department regulations about selling baked goods. A float was discussed also. It was decided that it would be nice just to use a pick up truck and decorate that instead. Tim Gordon volunteered his truck.
- Lena Area Church Cooperative: The Council was informed that the LACC might be disbanding at the end of the year. There is no need to include them on the Councils year end disbursement of Endowment Interest funds.
- Clavinova: , A church family has approached a Council member about the possibility of purchasing the Clavinova. After much discussion, a motion was made to let the family know that they may purchase the Clavinova in "As Is Condition" and to make a monetary donation to the church for what they thought it is worth. The donation is to go into the Memorial Fund to be sued for music for the church. Motion approved.

Having no other business before the Council, the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer. Next meeting will be on September 21, 2023 at 6:30pm.



Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died October 7, 1787

Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg (MYOO-len-berg) was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. . He helped Lutheran churches make the transition from the state churches of Europe to a new identity on American soil. Among other things, he established the first Lutheran synod in America and developed an American Lutheran liturgy. His liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888, used in many North American service books for a majority of the past century. That Muhlenberg and his work are remembered today was anticipated at his death. The inscription on his grave reads, in Latin, "Who and what he was, future ages will know without a stone."
